




Average # of foster homes




Cats TNR'ed*


Community cat colonies managed by RCR

Highlights

Accomplishments

- Celebrated 35th anniversary
- More than \$81,500 in fundraising
- Met our goal of rescuing 400 cats
- Regina Cat Coalition created
- Excalipurr Cat Café partnership
- Mosaic Stadium fundraising events

Challenges

- Changes to Regina Humane Society policies
- Escalating veterinary costs
- Distemper outbreak
- Volunteers needed:
 - Bingo workers
 - Pet Rescue Co-chair
 - Mosaic Stadium Event Coordinator
 - Pet Rescue Event Coordinator

Board Highlights

- Operated in a solid financial position. Limiting intake to 400 cats and increasing adoption fees contributed to this.
- Our second PetSmart grant of \$10,000 sterilized 97 cats in 2017. Thank you, PetSmart Charities!
- Regina Cat Coalition partnership
- Improved technological organization and storage with addition of Tech Admin, leading to improved communication and professionalism

Challenges

- Cash flow uncertainty
- Escalating vet costs
 - Average cost per cat rescued was \$409 in 2017-18 and \$337 in 2016-17
- Co-chairs stretched beyond capacity

- Strategic planning
- Working with partners on a community cat strategy
- Grant applications
- Improve process for fundraising cash flows
- Succession planning
- Volunteer appreciation BBQ on August 18, 2018

Committee Highlights

Membership

• Lifetime Members: 35

• 2018 Annual Members: 39

• Active volunteers: approximately 180

Fundraising

- Mosaic Stadium events have been a huge fundraising opportunity made more than \$18,000 in revenue for the 2017 season (five months), which is (around the same amount as an entire year of bingo revenues)
- More than \$81,500 raised in fundraising (events and bingos; an additional \$6,000 on events over 2017-18)
- In attendance at events: 560 (60 more than 2017-18)

Accomplishments

- New Fundraising and Membership Co-Chair
- Supporters enjoying new and diverse events such as kitty yoga, wooden sign nights, plant nights and brunchraisers

Challenges

- Coordinating and attracting reliable volunteers for Mosaic Stadium events
- Need coordinator for Mosaic events
- Ongoing need for bingo volunteers

- Attempting a large pot 50/50
- Exploring online options for annual winter raffle
- RBC Day of Service Grants
- Standardizing way to approach businesses for donations, tracking for future years and utilizing electronic means of communication

Accomplishments

- RCR appeared in 12 media stories
- Published monthly e-bulletins
- 2018 RCR calendar was another success. Profits on par with 2017 calendar. (\$2,864 vs \$2,932).
- RCR-branded clothing still in demand. New offerings this year with tank tops, 35th anniversary tees and TNR sweatshirts.

Challenges

- Lack of resources to carry out day-to-day operations and new initiatives
- Finding and retaining volunteers who are skilled and committed
- Raising awareness about what services RCR is able to provide (we are not equipped for emergency situations, we do not take surrendered pets, etc.)

- To identify and take advantage of education opportunities for the public
- Finish work on refreshing outdated content on the website
- Respond to inquiries from the public within 24 hours

Accomplishments

- Met rescue cap of 400 cats (403 in 2017 included adopted cats that were returned)
- New rescue management software eases administrative load on volunteers
- New adoption partnership: Excalipurr Cat Café (close to 70 adoptions since summer 2017)
- Record of 92 foster homes during summer peak

Challenges

- Need Pet Rescue co-chair
- Distemper present in Regina area 13 deaths (and took foster homes out of commission)
- Ongoing foster home recruitment challenges for adult cats
- Adoption partnerships have increased, leading to more requests for events than is currently manageable

- Recruit new co-chair
- Recruit dedicated event coordinator
- Divide up work to avoid volunteer burnout
- Looking into pet insurance partnership

Accomplishments

- Baby Grey, a nine-year-old community cat, was finally trapped after eight years of trying
- Jenny, a community cat with bad ear mites, was finally trapped (though it took over an hour to coax her out of the drop trap and into a transfer cage!)

Challenges

- Trapping equipment is old and needs to be replaced
- Difficult to trap community cats when they are ill or injured
- Foster homes to socialize feral kittens needed
- Extremely cold winter meant inability to trap

- Replace and repair existing feeding stations and make new ones to replace worn out or stolen stations and shelters
- Help private citizens who are caring for community cats by providing them with trapping and sterilization
